- The Post-16 education is the study of A-Levels, which are used as a form of preparation for admission into university.
- Students generally study **three or four subjects** to A-Level relevant to their chosen degree subject.
- AS Level results range from A E and are awarded by external examination bodies.
- AS Level exams are taken at the end of Year 12, while A2 level exams are taken at the end of Year 13.



Admission Entry Requirement

- Take a minimum of FOUR subjects at AS/BTEC Level.
- Achieve a minimum of five 9 to 6 grades at IGCSE and minimum of a 6 in four subjects selected to study for AS Level.
- It is mandatory to get a 6 for Maths and English in IGCSE.



Admission Entry Requirement

- Attendance
- Good record of behaviour and conduct.
- Participation in school activities.
- Any subjects undertaken at AS Level/BTEC will require you to complete the course to the end of the academic year.
- All students must follow the uniform code, which will be outlined when a place is offered.

Every year on September 16, the world comes together to celebrate the International Day for the Ozone Layer.




Study periods and time management

The workload increases dramatically from iGCSE to A level and students need to have a practical approach to their learning.

Making the best use of time, both in and out of school, is part of the Post 16 learning curve. A level courses require students to work substantially beyond lessons.

Good organisation is crucial, as is the ability to work independently, whilst seeking advice from teaching staff.

As a general guide, students should be studying 3-4 hours per day beyond their lessons, either in school or at home.

Psychometric test

A psychometric test is used to assess a candidate's cognitive ability and their personality. From a candidate's response psychometric testing can predict valuable insights such as job performance, competence, and motivations. There are two general types of psychometric tests: ability tests and personality tests.

Psychometric tests help students to get to know their strengths and weaknesses better. Through a set of simple questions or queries, psychometric tests try to understand an individual's capabilities. These questions are designed to interpret the student's physical and cognitive state and their conditioning.
